Hand washing is the single most important thing you can do to protect yourself and our patients and reduce the spread of infection

Most Healthcare Associated Infections are preventable through good hand hygiene, at the right time and in the correct way. Germs that naturally live on the skin and normally cause few problems may be more serious when brought into hospital. These germs are often passed from one person to another by physical contact so it is important that patients, visitors and staff reduce the risk of spreading infections by effectively washing their hands.

It's OK to ask!

Protect yourself by asking staff if they have cleaned their hands before they have any contact with you. Staff will not mind being reminded and it's important that you are reassured.

When to clean your hands?

We endeavour to do our best to protect you from infection but we need your help. Remember to wash your hands at these key times:

- · If your hands are visibly dirty.
- · Before eating or handling food.
- · After using the toilet/ commode/ bed pan/ urinal.
- · After changing nappies.
- If you are a patient and have diarrhoea and/or vomiting.
- · After coughing or sneezing

Nursing staff will assist you if required, for example if you have any drips or dressings that make hand-washing difficult. Again, it's OK to ask.

It is especially important for patients, visitors and staff to wash hands with soap and water before entering and when leaving a ward or clinical area where there are patients experiencing symptoms of diarrhoea and vomiting. Further advice should be sought from the Nurse in charge of the ward/department.

Hand Washing

This is sufficient for general social contact and most clinical care activities. Hand washing can be used to maintain personal hygiene and should always be used when hands are visibly dirty.

Alcohol Hand Gel

This is a quick and convenient alternative to hand washing for hands that are visibly clean. If hands are contaminated with dirt, alcohol gel is not effective and washing with soap and water is required.

Hand wipes

Patients may be offered hand wipes as an alternative to hand washing in some areas during their hospital stay. Please ensure you dispose of hand wipes in waste bins and not in toilets as this can lead to blockages.

Hand washing technique

For an effective hand wash, wet your hands on both sides, apply enough soap to cover hands, rub the palms of your hands together and then the backs of your hands making a good lather. Ensure you open your fingers so you can wash in between, rub the tips of your fingers and also wash your thumbs and wrists. Rinse well and then dry thoroughly. See diagram below.





Everyday words...

Normally shorter – less than 3 beats

Use as few medical words and as little jargon as you can


Sometimes it'll be a phrase rather than a word

If you have to use jargon, put the simple word first followed by the hard word in brackets


If you are using an acronym, put the word first and then the acronym in brackets

Be warm and friendly

Avoid corporate, complicated language

Avoid using the third person



What is this leaflet about?

Hand washing is the most important thing you can do to protect yourself and other patients. It also helps to reduce the spread of infection. This leaflet will tell you how best to keep your hands clean.

Most infections are avoidable through good hand hygiene, at the right time and in the right way. Germs naturally live on your skin and normally cause few problems. But, when you bring them in hospital they may be more serious. You often pass these germs by physical contact so it is important that everyone washes their hands properly.

It's ok to ask! You can ask us if we have cleaned our hands before we have any contact with you. We don't mind being reminded. It's important that you are reassured, too.

When should I clean my hands?

We try to do our best to protect you from infection but we need your help. Remember to wash your hands at these times:

- · If your hands are dirty.
- · Before eating.
- · Before touching food.
- After using the toilet, commode, bed pan or urinal.
- After changing nappies.
- If you are being sick.
- If you have diarrhoes (where your poo is more watery or you are pooing more often).
- · After coughing or sneezing.

We will help you if you need it. For example, if you have any drips or dressings that make washing your hands difficult. Again, it's ok to ask.

Everyone must wash their hands with soap and water before entering and when leaving a ward or clinical area if someone has diarrhoea and vomiting. You can ask for more advice from the Nurse in charge of the ward or department.

When is hand washing enough?

This is enough for social contact and most clinical care activities. You can wash your hands to keep yourself clean. You should always do this when your hands are dirty.

When should I use alcohol hand sanitiser?

This is a quick and easy alternative to hand washing. Use hand sanitiser when **your hands look clean**. If your hands are covered with dirt, you need to wash your hands with soap and water. Alcohol sanitiser will not work.

Can I use hand wipes?

We may offer you hand wipes as an alternative to hand washing in some areas. Please make sure you get rid of hand wipes in waste bins. Do not flush them away in toilets as this can lead to blockages.

How should I wash my hands?

You must wet your hands on both sides and put enough soap on to cover your hands. Rub the palms of your hands together and then the backs of your hands making a good lather. Make sure you open your fingers so you can wash in between. Rub the tips of your fingers and also wash your thumbs and wrists. Rinse them well and then dry thoroughly. These steps should take at least 20 seconds. See the diagram below.



Readability

Readability, reading grade, reading age ...

How easy it is to read your writing

Short sentences + short words = lower readability



Flesch-Kincaid reading grade

The lower the score, the easier it is to read

Score from 0 to 12+

Aim for a reading grade of 6 or lower

Flesch-Kincaid Reading Grade	Age (years)	Readability
5 th Grade	10 – 11	Very easy
6 th Grade	11 – 12	Easy
7 th Grade	12 – 13	Fairly easy
8 – 9 th Grade	13 – 15	Standard
10 – 12 th Grade	15 – 18	Fairly difficult
College Grade	18 – 21	Difficult
Above College	21 +	Very confusing




