




Improving NHS Talking Therapies for Autistic People



- **Research Collaborative**: Cumbria, Northumberland, Tyne & Wear NHS Foundation Trust, University of Cumbria, University of Newcastle, Northumbria University. Additional collaborators from Lancashire & South Cumbria NHS Foundation Trust and University of Strathclyde. Initial report for North East and North Cumbria Integrated Care Board.
- Approach: Three-part, mixed-methods project.
 - Semi-structured interviews with autistic people and clinicians with experience of Talking Therapies services (UoC-led).
 - Training needs analysis.
 - Training design: implementation and evaluation.
- **Findings/Interventions**: Autistic people and clinicians reported that Talking Therapies services need significant adaptation (including clinician training) to better meet the needs of autistic people. Training was then designed, which clinicians reported had a positive impact. Changes were also made to a single Talking Therapies service, in how they identified autistic people, which led to approximately 5% of clients being identified as autistic (or having similar needs that required adaptations to therapies).
- **Next**: Journal papers nearing completion. Expanded group now working to develop a large-scale research funding proposal to NIHR to build on this work and help evaluate the usefulness of these service changes, particularly the impact they have upon autistic people's experience of Talking Therapies.


- Active research group since 1999 looking at radiological expertise and determinants of performance









Interpersonal Violence and Abuse

Examples of work conducted within this area and published by staff at UoC:

- Understanding the experiences of male victims of domestic abuse (Bates, 2020)
- Male victims and their injuries (Khurana et al., 2022)
- Post-separation experiences of male victims of abuse (Bates et al., 2024)
- Exploring retrospective experiences of children growing up in homes where there is violence and abuse – including the barriers to their help-seeking (Taylor, Bates & Wright, 2023)
- Discourse analysis on how male victims are presented within news media (Harper et al., 2023)

- Connecting Communities, (UKRI) collaborative project to create a community research network in Cumbria with Cumbria Education Development Centre, Open Source Arts, Cumbria CVS, Groundwork North East and North Cumbria, Anti Racist Cumbria, All together communities, University of Cumbria and others
 - o Pilot phase successfully completed, now applying for implementation phase funding.
