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










- 1. To approve the introduction of an organ donation scheme based on 'deemed consent' subject to the safeguards and exemptions set out in this Policy Letter;
- 2. To direct the preparation of such legislation as may be necessary to give effect to their above decision.

The above Propositions have been submitted to Her Majesty's Procureur for advice on any legal or constitutional implications in accordance with Rule 4(1) of the Rules of Procedure of the States of Deliberation and their Committees.

6 months - the additional length of time a minority ethnic patient waits for an organ transplant (Source: NHSBT ODT BAME report)







### **Progress Report for BAME Community Investment Scheme Initiative**

2020



































#### Summary of what was delivered through the BAME community investment scheme

Projects were delivered between November 2018 and end June 2019 with a few projects asking for, and being granted, short extensions.

#### Events and materials delivered

**211** events

46 new videos, education materials, flyers or posters produced.

#### People reached

130,000 Approximate footfall at events where there was an organ donation stand

**4.100** Approximate number of people who engaged in a conversation at a stand or who took away information materials

7,900 Approximate number of people attending a talk/workshop about donation.

#### Associated publicity

14 Approximate number of press releases issued by projects

65 Approximate number of broadcast media interviews secured involving people delivering projects

18 Approximate number of print articles secured involving people delivering projects

**62,000** Approximate number of video views

244 mentions of organ donation on Twitter from organisations delivering projects, reaching over 750,000 people.

The support of the organisations funded through the first scheme has continued on social media. There were 97 mentions on social media, reaching over 350,000 people in the four months after the end of the projects

#### Actions taken

**371** people pledged to have a conversation with their families about organ donation

909 people completed organ donor registration forms.

These figures are approximate and have been collated from the final project evaluation reports provided by the organisations.

Whilst we tried to encourage consistencies in reporting between projects as part of our evaluation process, not all metrics were provided by all projects. The figures above are therefore an underestimate of what was actually delivered. The number of those not willing to donate decreased and we saw an increase in consideration of donation. In May 2018, **37%** of respondents told us that they definitely wouldn't donate their organs compared to 20% in March 2019.

In March 2019, **43%** of respondents told us they would consider donating some of their organs compared to 30% in May 2018.

### Organ donation in Black, Asian and ethnic minority communities

One donor can save or transform up to **nine lives** by donating organs

#### So much has been achieved...



The number of Black, Asian and minority ethnic deceased organ donors has increased by **67%** over the last 5 years



There has been an increase in **black deceased donors**, highlighting the hard work and dedication from the black community

#### But there's still work to be done

Black, Asian and minority ethnic patients are **over-represented** on the transplant waiting list. 3 in 10 people waiting are from a Black, Asian or minority ethnic background.

Black and Asian patients wait longer on average due to a shortage of organ donors, with Black patients waiting around 900 days and Asian patients waiting 736 days in comparison with 573 days for white patients BAME families are **less likely** than white families to consent to organ donation when a relative dies (42.3% compared to 71.0%) as of 2019/20
